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Dear Friends of Free Wheelchair Mission,

As another year ends, I'm overjoyed at the thousands of lives that are forever transformed by the power and simplicity of mobility. In 2014 alone, we distributed 87,867 wheelchairs, providing the gift of mobility to the "least of these." Our vision is clear: to distribute 1 million chairs in developing nations by the end of 2016.

I would like to take a moment to share with you one of our recent stories.

Praise is a seven-year-old boy who lives in the Dete area of western Zimbabwe. His mother died a few years ago, so his aunt cares for him. He suffers from hydrocephalus and is unable to walk. His aunt wants Praise to go to school and church, but he is too heavy for her to carry, so they are both confined to their home. They were both so excited for Praise to receive his GEN_2 wheelchair — now the two attend church together and the family plans to enroll Praise in school!

Over the last year, we have continued to expand our reach as a leading provider of mobility, delivering an average of 241 wheelchairs per day. It is estimated that there are as many as 100 million people trapped in a life defined by disability in the developing world—Free Wheelchair Mission continues its commitment to support transformation that opens doors to education, employment opportunities and community.

We value innovation, and this last year we made some significant progress. As you read this report, you will see some of the amazing discoveries we are gaining in our Transformation Investigation. We are in the development stages of our GEN_4 wheelchair that will allow recipients with upper body strength to comfortably travel tens of miles per day. We are helping orthopedic hospitals restore mobility through surgery, thus eliminating the permanent need for a wheelchair, ever! And thanks to our friends in the Physical Therapy Department of Azusa Pacific University, we are taking our major provisioning partners through a five day training course so they can better serve wheelchair recipients in their region.

Together, as Free Wheelchair Mission ambassadors, financial supporters and volunteers, we can continue to show God's love through the transformational gift of mobility. It has been a wonderful, fruitful year of lifting those in need from the ashes of disability.

STRATEGIC INITIATIVES

2014 OUTCOMES

Since its inception in 2001, Free Wheelchair Mission has continued to grow year after year, endeavoring toward our mission of "providing the transforming gift of mobility to the physically disabled poor in developing countries as motivated by Jesus Christ".

During fiscal year 2014, we have focused our resources toward organizational growth in three main areas:



INTERNATIONAL WHEELCHAIR PROVISIONING PARTNERS

Partner growth strategy implemented

The ability of FWM to fulfill our mission of providing the transforming gift of mobility is tremendously reliant on our international partnerships. As a direct result of feedback we've received from the field through our Transformation Investigation, we launched a multi-year partner growth strategy this fiscal year designed to provide a structure for large-capacity partners to deepen the impact of their wheelchair programs and serve each recipient more holistically. Significant resources will be dedicated to developing an advanced wheelchair training program for our partners, helping them continue to improve in both efficiency and effectiveness in the field.



INNOVATION

Preliminary GEN_3 wheelchair field testing initiated

In alignment with our core value of "innovating to provide transformative mobility solutions", we are proud to share an update regarding our newest wheelchair design, the GEN_3. This fiscal year we finished the design for our GEN_3 wheelchair (a folding version of our GEN_2) and implemented field testing in Peru, Uganda and Vietnam. Feedback from our manufacturers, provisioning partners and recipients regarding their experiences with these test containers have given us invaluable information that will be used as we develop a global roll-out strategy for GEN_3.



REGIONAL GROWTH

Regional growth strategy developed

We cannot continue to effectively address the huge demand for wheelchairs around the globe without having additional growth at home. This fiscal year we developed a multi-year regional growth plan to expand our presence across the United States. Additional regional offices will provide us with new resources and strategic growth opportunities. Hiring for our Georgia and Texas locations will begin in early fiscal year 2015. These new regional offices, in conjunction with our representative in Idaho and our headquarters in California, will continue to strive toward our vision of transforming the lives of one million people by the end of 2016.


A LIFE TRANSFORMED

Mobility dramatically improves a recipient's way of life. While we don't always get to see all the ways that a wheelchair changes someone's life, sometimes just seeing the smile on the recipient's face as they are placed into their wheelchair is more than enough to understand the positive impact it has on them.

At four years old, Menzi from Swaziland cannot walk or talk and his neck is not strong enough to support his head, but that doesn't stop him from smiling every time he hears his parents' voices. He is the youngest of four children and the only one with health issues. Menzi's parents have tried to help their child in a variety of ways, including traveling nearly 100 miles to see a doctor in the hopes that they would be able to improve the quality of his daily life. When they heard about The Luke Commission's partnership with Free Wheelchair Mission, they knew they had found an answer that would ease their concerns for their son.

Menzi was able to receive his very own GEN_2 wheelchair and his happiness was

apparent to everyone around him. Now he will be able to spend more quality time with his siblings and interact with them while they play. "He will be so happy to be with them," his mother lovingly noted.



TRANSFORMATION INVESTIGATION

CONTINUING TO MEASURE THE IMPACT OF A WHEELCHAIR

Last year we introduced you to our Transformation Investigation, a longitudinal study of 600 wheelchair participants in three countries, across three continents: Peru (South America), Uganda (Africa) and Vietnam (Asia). The purpose of this project is twofold: to quantify the impact that receiving a FWM wheelchair has on the life of a recipient and to collect feedback on our wheelchair product and provisioning program for continued improvement.

The data from the study comes from six surveys that are administered via in–person visits with each participant once every six months over the three–year timeframe. Visits are conducted by a native college–educated, credentialed analyst hired within each participating country. The

questions and results of the surveys are categorized into the following eight areas of transformation: spiritual, educational, financial, social, physical health, mobility, psychological health and overall wheelchair durability.

During 2014 two additional surveys were completed, with the final two surveys to be administered in 2015.

We expect to have an analysis of our findings from all six surveys in 2016. The results from the six surveys combined with the feedback from our analysts will provide actionable steps for product and program improvements along with insight regarding the long-term impact mobility has on the lives of those we serve.

While not all data has been collected, some significant preliminary trends we have noticed so far indicate:



SPIRITUAL

A continued positive trend of attitudes toward the Christian church

EDUCATION

Operation Blessing, a Free Wheelchair Mission distribution partner, began disaster relief work in San Luis Potosi, Mexico after devastating fires ravaged the area. During one particular food distribution, they met Mary, an eleven-year-old girl.

Mary was born with clubfeet that went untreated and left her without full mobility. She is very smart and wanted to attend school, but her limited mobility made traveling to school very difficult. Recognizing the great need and equally great potential in this young girl, Operation Blessing gave Mary a custom fit, GEN_2 wheelchair from FWM that was perfect for the terrain in her hometown. That day, the right wheelchair met an excited and very patient little girl. She quickly realized she was able to navigate the rocky terrain near her home. The wheelchair allowed her to freely roam around—now, with her new gift of mobility, Mary gets to attend school like all of the other children!




FISCAL YEAR 2014 FINANCIALS

In 2014, we worked hard to increase our efficiency in both raising and spending money. We are proud to report that the percentage of funds used directly for program services increased by 6 percentage points, while the percentages spent on administrative and fundraising expenses both decreased. We strive to continually maximize our effectiveness as we deliver the gift of mobility, and thanks to donors and partners like you, 2014 was a strong year of growth.
